Market climate

Sadly 2022, annus horribilis, will be remembered for the wrong reasons. However, the year started relatively brightly... It was the beginning of the end of the Covid pandemic, the global economy was gaining momentum, supply chains were starting to recover and markets were optimistic after a very prosperous 2021, when the majority of global indices reached historic levels. The tidal wave of inflation, which was still said to be "transitory", had not yet reached our shores and central banks were still maintaining accommodative levels for the economy and the markets.

We all know what happened next... On 24 February, Russia invaded Ukraine. Commodity prices began to soar and supply chains were once again faced with disruption, threatening the world with energy and food crises. In the second guarter, inflation reached record levels around the world. With inflation proving to be less transitory than expected, central banks embarked on the most brutal cycle of rate hikes in history, sending markets plunging. At the end of the second quarter, the major global bond and equity indices displayed losses of over -10% and -15% respectively. The decline was even greater for risk assets. However, corporate profits remained relatively robust, driven by household consumption. The third guarter was marked by new record levels of inflation, new rate hikes, a slowing Chinese economy and Russia closing the pipelines, thus depriving Europe of natural gas. Faced with the increased risk of a severe recession, the markets continued to fall. However, every now and then, there were waves of optimism that led to recoveries, albeit temporary. Thankfully, the last three months of the year were more positive for the markets. Data on employment, household consumption and company profits pointed towards a resilient economy (thanks to state aid, amongst other measures). Against this backdrop, inflation stabilised before gradually declining, essentially owing to the fall in commodity prices. Moreover, the fairly mild temperatures in the autumn dampened demand for energy (mainly electricity and gas), while a fall in inflation raised the possibility of a slowdown in monetary tightening by central banks as early as December. After several consecutive 0.75% rate increases, they finally raised their rates by a "mere" 0.50%. However, despite the slow but steady decline in inflation, new warnings and an "aggressive" tone have somewhat tempered the optimism of the past months, leading to a correction in equities (-3.5%, -5% and -9% in EUR for the European, emerging and US indices respectively) and bonds (between -3% and -5% in EUR depending on the indices).

The markets therefore closed the year in negative territory with the S&P500 (USA) down by 13%, European indices down by 9.5% and emerging markets down by 15% (in EUR terms). Bond markets posted losses between -10% and -20% across indices. 2022 was also painful for mixed portfolios, as equity/bond diversification did not work in this environment of rapidly rising interest rates. In the equity segment, the energy sector was the only one to end the year in the black. The more defensive sectors (utilities and durable consumer goods) posted limited downside losses, while the technology, telecoms and consumer discretionary sectors suffered significant losses (between -25% and -33%). After losing 15% of its value against the US dollar between January and October, the euro then recovered, closing the year at USD 1.07, a 5% decline compared to the beginning of the year.

Fund overview and performance

FFG - Global Flexible Sustainable – Manager: BLI - Banque de Luxembourg Investment S.A.

Investment and sustainability objectives & policy

The objective of the sub-fund is to achieve a medium-turn return exceeding a bond investment in EUR. To this end, the Sub-fund is invested without geographical, sectoral and currency restrictions in equities, bonds (including, but not limited to, inflation-linked bonds), money market instruments or cash.

In addition to its financial objective, the Sub-fund generates a tangible social impact, through the intermediary of the Distribution Coordinator of the SICAV, whose approach is certified by Forum Ethibel. After deducting its operating costs, the Distribution Coordinator pays out either 50% of its net profits or 10% of its turnover (whichever amount is higher) to the social project that it has set up itself and which it manages: "Funds For Good Impact". "Funds for Good Impact" devotes all of its financial resources to the fight against poverty and to job creation by granting interest-free unsecured loans and support to disadvantaged people with a business plan, thus enabling them to launch their activity. More information is available at www.fundsforgood.eu.

The Sub-fund promotes environmental and/or social characteristics within the meaning of Article 8 of the Sustainability Regulation. The selection of assets or UCITS or other UCIs making up the Sub-fund's portfolio will comply with the Responsible Investment Policy of Funds For Good, which is available in full at <u>www.fundsforgood.eu</u>. Furthermore, the Sub-fund promotes environmental and/or social characteristics within the meaning of Article 8 of the Sustainability Regulation and will invest a minimum of 30% of its net assets in sustainable assets as defined in Article 2(17) of the Sustainability regulation.

Please note that the change in SFDR classification from Art. 9 to Art. 8, initiated in the second half of 2022. There are two main reasons for this change, which did not affect the composition of the portfolio. On the one hand, the interpretation of the SFDR regulation has been clarified by the competent authorities and new legal opinions have indicated that the sustainability objective of a fund should apply to each individual line of the portfolio. As a result, the sustainability targets that had been set at the level of the portfolio as a whole proved insufficient. On the other hand, in view of this, and after discussion with the investment manager, it was concluded that the Article 9 classification, which would require a sustainable investment methodology to be applied to the whole portfolio, would distort the strategy and be contrary to the interests of the fund's investors. Therefore, in agreement with the investment manager, it was decided to establish a minimum sustainable investment of 30% of the total net assets of the portfolio, which must be respected in all market conditions. It is expected that the Sub-fund will invest on average 60% to 70% of its assets in sustainable assets. In this case, a sustainable asset is an investment in a company whose carbon trajectory is aligned with the Paris climate agreement.

To conclude, the Sub-fund does not take into account the European Union criteria for environmentally sustainable economic activities as defined in the Taxonomy Regulation. The alignment of the Sub-fund with the Taxonomy Regulation has not been calculated. As the Fund does not take into account the EU criteria for environmentally sustainable economic activities, the principle of "do no significant harm" does not apply to the Fund's investments.

Performance in 2022

The fund's performance in 2022 (for its I Acc units in EUR) is -12.20% compared to -12.74% for the corresponding Morningstar category and -12.20% for a 60/40 portfolio.

The equity segment contributed to three-quarters of the performance. With an average return of -9.5% over the year, the equity portfolio outperformed a diversified global equity index (MSCI World All Country, -13%) thanks to stock selection. Please note that this outperformance has been achieved without energy companies, which are the only ones to end 2022 in the green. However, they are obviously excluded by the fund's ESG policy. Technology, consumer and telecoms companies contributed positively to performance, while industrials, energy and consumer durables contributed negatively to performance. In addition, the underexposure to the US had a positive impact on performance.

Within the equity portfolio, the main positive contributors were Travelsky Technology (aviation technology), Gilead Sciences (pharmaceuticals) and Kalbe Farma (healthcare).

The main negative contributors were the Asian companies China Feihe (consumer products) and Alibaba (online retail) and Adobe (software).

The bond portfolio has contributed to the remaining quarter of the performance. The manager invests mainly in securities with long maturities (30-year US treasuries), which are more sensitive to rate increases, hence their average yield of -30% during 2022. However, their weighting remained low for most of the year (5.5% in April, 8.5% in August). The manager then gradually increased the weight of these treasuries to 16.4% at the end of the year, expecting a peak in the rate hike over the coming year.

Although equity and bond hedging strategies contributed only marginally to the return in 2022, they nevertheless allowed the volatility of the fund's NAV to be reduced significantly, from 11.5% to 8%.

To conclude, it is worth noting that the ESG policy of the fund has been strengthened and the share of sustainable equities in the portfolio increased in the second half of 2022. "Sustainable shares" are shares of companies whose carbon trajectory is aligned with the Paris Agreement. As part of this effort to promote more sustainability in the portfolio, several positions related to gold and gold-mining activities have been closed, as these activities do not / no longer fit with the sustainability objective of the fund. Similarly, a major gold position, Franco Nevada, had to be divested as it no longer met the Towards Sustainability criteria (more than 5% of its revenues from unconventional oil and gas).

In line with Funds For Good's Responsible Investment Policy, the portfolio's carbon footprint was on average 80% lower than that of a global equity index, its Labor Management Score was on average 17% higher than that of a global equity index, the average ESG rating was AA (the minimum being BBB for developed market stocks and BB for emerging market companies). This rating was even increased to AAA in the second half of the year. The average ESG score for the year was 8.7/10.

FFG - Cleantech II - Manager: Capricorn Partners NV

Investment and sustainability objectives & policy

The Sub-fund aims to achieve long-term capital growth. It is actively managed and mainly invests directly in the shares of cleantech companies listed on regulated markets. The notion of cleantech covers all products and services intended to ensure cleaner and more efficient use of the earth's natural resources: energy, water, air, raw materials, etc. The Sub-fund targets companies operating in sectors of activity such as renewable energies, energy efficiency, water treatment, waste recycling and pollution control, as well as state-of-the-art materials. On an ancillary basis, the Sub-fund may invest in the shares of clean-tech companies listed on regulated markets located in emerging countries.

The Sub-fund promotes environmental attributes and/or social benefits within the meaning of Article 8 of the Sustainability Regulation. The selection of assets or UCITS or other UCIs making up the Sub-

fund's portfolio will comply with the Responsible Investment Policy of Funds For Good, which is available in full at <u>www.fundsforgood.eu</u>. In addition, the Sub-fund will invest a minimum of 51% of its net assets in sustainable assets as defined in Article 2(17) of the Sustainability Regulations.

However, the Sub-fund does not take into account the European Union criteria for environmentally sustainable economic activities as defined in the Taxonomy Regulation. The alignment of the Sub-fund with the Taxonomy Regulation has not been calculated. As the Sub-fund does not take into account the EU criteria for environmentally sustainable economic activities, the principle of "do no significant harm" does not apply to the Fund's investments.

Performance in 2022

With a decline of 4.39% in December, the fund ended 2022 down 20.72% (for its I Acc units in EUR). The Stoxx Europe 600, the fund's initial universe, fell by 10.6%, while the Stoxx Europe Small 200 (the 200 smallest companies in the Stoxx Europe 600) declined by 24%. Aixtron and Accell made the largest positive contribution to performance in 2022. Conversely, construction-related stocks such as Steico, Lindab and Kingspan fell the most, each losing over 50%.

Over the whole of 2022, three new position were added to the portfolio: DEME, a marine and offshore wind engineering company; Signify, a producer of LED lighting; and Aixtron, a producer of compound semiconductor equipment. Two of the three new listings (DEME and Aixtron) performed positively while the markets were down.

The two stocks that were removed from the portfolio posted contrasting results: Knorr-Bremse disappointed and was sold at a loss. However, Accell, the electric bicycle specialist, rose by more than 100% over 18 months following a takeover bid.

In line with the "Funds For Good" Responsible Investment Policy, the portfolio's exposure to Cleantech was 73% on average over 2022. Each portfolio company derived at least one third of its revenues/profits from the sustainability sectors promoted by the fund (renewable energy, resource efficiency and energy efficiency).

FFG - European Equities Sustainable – Manager: Acadian Asset Management LLC

Investment and sustainability objectives & policy

The sub-fund seeks long-term capital growth through a diversified portfolio composed mainly of shares of European issuers listed and traded on regulated markets. The sub-fund is actively managed and has the Morgan Stanley Capital International Europe Index (the "MSCI Europe Index") as its benchmark.

In addition to its financial objective, the Sub-fund generates a tangible social impact, through the intermediary of the Distribution Coordinator of the SICAV, whose approach is certified by Forum Ethibel. After deducting its operating costs, the Distribution Coordinator pays out either 50% of its net profits or 10% of its turnover (whichever amount is higher) to the social project that it has set up itself and which it manages: "Funds For Good Impact". "Funds for Good Impact" devotes all of its financial resources to the fight against poverty and to job creation by granting interest-free unsecured loans and support to disadvantaged people with a business plan, thus enabling them to launch their activity. More information is available at www.fundsforgood.eu.

Furthermore, the investment manager was not in a position to verify the sustainability of the investments, as defined in Art. 2(17) of the Sustainability Regulation. To conclude, please note that the carbon reduction target has been taken a step further, with the fund required to have total emissions at least half those of the Sub-fund's benchmark (50% compared to 20% previously).

The Sub-fund does not take into account the European Union criteria for environmentally sustainable economic activities as defined in the Taxonomy Regulation. The alignment of the Sub-fund with the Taxonomy Regulation has not been calculated. As the Sub-fund does not take into account the EU criteria for environmentally sustainable economic activities, the principle of "do no significant harm" does not apply to the Fund's investments.

Performance in 2022

The fund's performance in 2022 (for its I Acc units in EUR) was -19.46% compared to -9.5% for its benchmark, the MSCI Europe. Owing to the fund's ESG and small & mid caps biases, we believe it would be helpful to compare the fund's performance with two indices that also incorporate these biases. The MSCI Europe SRI (taking into account ESG characteristics) is down -14% while the MSCI Europe Mid Caps and MSCI Europe Small Caps indices are down -19.3% and -22.5% respectively.

Unsurprisingly, it is mainly the small & mid caps bias that is responsible for the underperformance of the fund in 2022. Economic crises are likely to have a greater impact on smaller companies. This can have an impact on their valuation due to the downward revision of their future earnings but also creates a price effect via the disengagement of large investors who reduce their risk appetite in times of unrest. The first positions to be sold are often these smaller, riskier companies and, as such, 2022 was no exception to this phenomenon.

The top contributors in 2022 were Novo Nordisk (healthcare), OCI (equipment) and Andritz (hydroelectric plant equipment). Conversely, the worst contributors were ASML (semiconductors), Straumann Holding and Roche (both pharmaceutical companies).

In line with the responsible investment policy of "Funds For Good", the portfolio's carbon footprint was on average 62% lower than its benchmark, its Labor Management Score was on average 6% higher than that of a global equity index, as the manager chose to remove stocks in the lowest 5% of the universe. The manager does not report an average ESG rating, but the selection criteria for securities have been met (the minimum being BBB for developed market securities and BB for emerging market companies). The average ESG score for the year was 7.8/10.

FFG - European Equities Sustainable Moderate – Manager: Acadian Asset Management LLC

Investment and sustainability objectives & policy

The Sub-fund is a feeder sub-fund which invests at least 85% of its net assets in the FFG – European Equities Sustainable sub-fund (the "Master Fund"), and more precisely in the I class. On an ancillary basis, a systematic hedging of the equity exposure will be implemented in order to limit the exposure of the Sub-fund to the risks of the equity markets. Hedging will limit the fund's exposure to the equity market to a maximum of 50%. Portfolio assets not invested in the Master Fund or in hedging instruments will be held as cash in the Sub-fund.

In addition to its financial objective, the Sub-fund generates a tangible social impact, through the intermediary of the Distribution Coordinator of the SICAV, whose approach is certified by Forum Ethibel. After deducting its operating costs, the Distribution Coordinator pays out either 50% of its net profits or 10% of its turnover (whichever amount is higher) to the social project that it has set up itself and which it manages: "Funds For Good Impact". "Funds for Good Impact" devotes all of its financial resources to the fight against poverty and to job creation by granting interest-free unsecured loans and support to disadvantaged people with a business plan, thus enabling them to launch their activity. Performance in 2022

The fund ended 2022 down 12.59% (for its I Acc units in EUR), compared with a decline of 15.41% for a 30% equities/70% bonds benchmark. The lack of exposure to bonds (which fell between -10% and - 15% over the year) was very beneficial, as was the net underexposure to equities (22% vs 30%), to a lesser extent. However, the +/- 10% underperformance of FFG European Equities Sustainable (the master fund in which the sub-fund invests the majority of its assets) compared to its own benchmark contributed negatively to the outperformance.

In line with the responsible investment policy of "Funds For Good", the portfolio's carbon footprint was on average 62% lower than its benchmark, its Labor Management Score was on average 6% higher than that of a global equity index, as the manager chose to remove stocks in the lowest 5% of the universe. The manager does not report an average ESG rating, but the selection criteria for securities have been met (the minimum being BBB for developed market securities and BB for emerging market companies). The average ESG score for the year was 7.8/10.

1. For each "Valuation Period" (as defined in point 2) during which the performance of the share class exceeds, in percentage terms, the performance of the "Reference Benchmark" (as defined in point 3), a fee of 15% on this positive difference in performance is payable to the Manager (calculated as described in points 4, 5 and 6). A provision will be made for this performance fee on each Valuation Day.

2. The performance fee is calculated over an annual Valuation Period, starting on the first business day of the relevant year and ending on the last business day of that year. The performance fee is paid within one month of the end of the relevant Valuation Period.

3. The reference benchmark is a composite benchmark calculated as follows: 30% EMIX World Europe NTR Index + 70% Bloomberg GETB1 Index - German government three-month bills + Alpha European Equities - Sustainable*poids European Equities - Sustainable.

4. The difference between the performance of the share class and the performance of the Benchmark will be calculated on each Valuation Day of the Valuation Period on the net assets of the day before deduction of the performance fee and accumulated over the Valuation Period. If the cumulative performance difference is positive at the end of the Valuation Period ("outperformance"), a performance fee will be payable to the Manager. If the cumulative performance difference is negative during the Valuation Period ("underperformance"), no performance fee will be payable to the Manager.

5. The performance fee is only payable in the event of an outperformance of the share class compared to its benchmark. In the particular case where the performance of the share class over the Valuation Period is negative but this performance is higher than the performance of the Benchmark (outperformance), a performance fee may be payable. In addition, any underperformance in one Valuation Period will be carried over to the next Valuation Period. In this way, any underperformance over a given Valuation Period will have to be recovered before a performance fee becomes payable at the end of a subsequent Valuation Period. The performance reference period is therefore the entire life of the Sub-fund.

Note 1 - General Information

FFG is a Variable Capital Investment Company ("Société d'Investissement à Capital Variable" - the "SICAV") with multiple Sub-Funds governed by Luxembourg law, subject to Part I of the Law of 17th December 2010 on Undertakings for Collective Investment, as amended ("2010 Law"). The SICAV was created for an unlimited period on 23rd December 2016.

Each year, the SICAV publishes an audited annual report as at 31st December, and an unaudited semiannual report as at 30th June.

The currency of the combined financial statements is the Euro.

The following documents are available to the public at the registered office of the SICAV and at the registered office of the Management Company:

- the Prospectus of the SICAV, including the fact sheets,
- the Articles of Incorporation,
- the SICAV's Key Information (also published on the website https://www.waystone.com),
- the financial reports of the SICAV.

Note 2 - Significant accounting policies

a) Presentation of the financial statements

The financial statements of the SICAV are prepared in accordance with the Luxembourg legal and regulatory requirements concerning Undertakings for Collective Investment and with generally accepted accounting principles in Luxembourg.

The financial statements of the SICAV have been prepared on a going concern basis.

b) Valuation of assets

- The value of cash on hand or on deposit, bills and notes due on demand, accounts receivable, prepaid expenses, dividends, and interest declared or due but not yet received consists of the nominal value of these assets, unless it is unlikely that this value is received, in which event, the value is determined by deducting an amount which the SICAV deems adequate to reflect the real value of these assets.
- 2. The value of all transferable securities and/or money market instruments and/or derivative financial instruments that are traded or listed on a stock exchange is determined based on the most recent available price.
- 3. The value of all transferable securities and/or money market instruments and/or any derivative financial instruments which are traded on a regulated market shall be based on the last available price.
- 4. To the extent that transferable securities in the portfolio on the day in question are not traded or listed on a stock exchange or regulated market or if for securities listed or traded on a stock exchange or regulated market the price determined in accordance with sub-paragraph 2. or 3. is not representative of the real value of such transferable securities, they will be valued on the basis of the probable realisation value, which must be estimated prudently and in good faith.
- 5. The value of derivative financial instruments that are not listed on a stock exchange or traded on another organized market will be determined daily in a reliable manner and verified by a competent professional appointed by the SICAV in accordance with market practice.
- 6. The underlying shares or units of open-ended investment funds will be valued at their last available net asset values, reduced by any applicable commissions.

- 7. The value of money market instruments that are not listed on a stock exchange or traded on another organised market will be based on the nominal value plus any capitalised interest or on an amortised cost basis.
- 8. In the event that the above-mentioned calculation methods are inappropriate or misleading, the Board of Directors may adopt any other valuation principle appropriate for the SICAV's assets.
- 9. In circumstances where the interests of the SICAV or its shareholders do justify it (in particular to avoid market timing practices), the Board of Directors may take any other appropriate measures, such as applying a fair value valuation methodology to adjust the value of the SICAV's assets.

c) Acquisition cost of securities in the portfolio

The acquisition cost of the securities held by each Sub-Fund that are denominated in currencies other than the reference currency of the Sub-Fund is converted into this currency at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of purchase.

d) Net realised gain/(loss) on securities portfolio

The realised gains and losses on securities portfolio are calculated on the basis of the average acquisition cost and are disclosed net in the statement of operations and other changes in net assets.

e) Investment portfolio income

Dividend income is recorded at the ex-date, net of any withholding tax.

Interest income accrued and payable is recorded, net of any withholding tax.

f) Valuation of futures contracts

Open futures contracts are valued at the last settlement or close price on the stock exchanges or regulated markets. Net unrealised gains or losses of open contracts are disclosed in the statement of net assets. Net variation of the unrealised gains or losses and net realised gains or losses are disclosed in the statement of operations and other changes in net assets.

g) Valuation of forward foreign exchange contracts

Open forward foreign exchange contracts are valued at forward market rates for the remaining period from valuation date to the maturity of the contracts. Net unrealised gains or losses of open contracts are disclosed in the statement of net assets. Net variation of unrealised gains or losses and net realised gains or losses are disclosed in the statement of operations and other changes in net assets.

h) Formation expenses

The formation expenses are amortised on a straight-line basis over a period of five years.

If the launch of a Sub-Fund occurs after the launch date of the SICAV, the formation expenses related to the launch of the new Sub-Fund is charged to such Sub-Fund alone and may be amortised over a maximum of five years with effect as from the Sub-Fund's launch date.

i) Conversion of foreign currencies

Cash at banks, other net assets and liabilities and the market value of the securities in portfolio expressed in currencies other than the reference currency of the Sub-Fund are converted into this currency at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of the financial statements. Income and expenses

incurred in currencies other than the reference currency of the Sub-Fund are converted at the prevailing exchange rate of the day of each transaction.

j) Combined financial statements

The combined financial statements of the SICAV are expressed in EUR and are equal to the sum of the corresponding items in the financial statements of each Sub-Fund.

k) Other receivables / Other liabilities

For the FFG - European Equities Sustainable Moderate Sub-Fund, the items "Other receivables" / "Other liabilities" disclosed in the statement of net assets include margin accounts on futures contracts reflecting to daily value variations.

I) Transaction fees

Transaction costs disclosed under the item "Transaction fees" in the expenses of the statement of operations and other changes in net assets are mainly composed of broker fees incurred by the Fund and of fees relating to transactions paid to the depositary as well as of transaction fees on financial instruments and derivatives.

Note 3 - Management and distribution fees and outperformance fees

For the FFG - European Equities Sustainable Moderate Sub-Fund:

The SICAV has appointed WAYSTONE MANAGEMENT COMPANY (LUX) S.A. (formerly MDO Management Company S.A.) as Management Company to provide it with management, administration and marketing services. The Management Company is approved as a Management Company in accordance with the provisions of chapter 15 of the Law of 2010.

The Management Company receives a management company fee of maximum 0.05% p.a. based on the average net assets of the Sub-fund with a minimum of EUR 10,000.

The Management Company has appointed ACADIAN ASSET MANAGEMENT LLC as Investment Manager to provide portfolio management services.

The Management Company has appointed FUNDS FOR GOOD S.A. as distribution coordinator. In this capacity, the distribution coordinator will have the task to appoint one or more distributors to place the shares of the SICAV's Sub-Funds.

The Management and Distribution Fee is paid respectively to the Investment Manager and the Distribution Coordinator by the SICAV. The Management and Distribution Fee is different according to the class of shares to which it applies.

The Management Fee includes outperformance fees. The outperformance fee remunerates the Investment Manager in the event that the performance of its hedge against market risks is higher than that which would have been generated by a fixed 70% hedge of the exposure to the Master Portfolio via futures. The remuneration will be calculated as follows:

1. For each "Valuation Period" (as defined in point 2) during which the performance of the share class exceeds, in percentage terms, the performance of the "Reference Benchmark" (as defined in point 3), a fee of 15% on this positive difference in performance is payable to the Manager (calculated as described in points 4, 5 and 6). A provision will be made for this performance fee on each Valuation Day.

2. The performance fee is calculated over an annual Valuation Period, starting on the first business day of the relevant year and ending on the last business day of that year. The performance fee is paid within one month of the end of the relevant Valuation Period.

3. The reference benchmark is a composite benchmark calculated as follows: 30% EMIX World Europe NTR Index + 70% Bloomberg GETB1 Index - German government three-month bills + Alpha European Equities - Sustainable*poids European Equities - Sustainable.

4. The difference between the performance of the share class and the performance of the Benchmark will be calculated on each Valuation Day of the Valuation Period on the net assets of the day before deduction of the performance fee and accumulated over the Valuation Period. If the cumulative performance difference is positive at the end of the Valuation Period ("outperformance"), a performance fee will be payable to the Manager. If the cumulative performance difference is negative during the Valuation Period ("underperformance"), no performance fee will be payable to the Manager.

5. The performance fee is only payable in the event of an outperformance of the share class compared to its benchmark. In the particular case where the performance of the share class over the Valuation Period is negative but this performance is higher than the performance of the Benchmark (outperformance), a performance fee may be payable. In addition, any underperformance in one Valuation Period will be carried over to the next Valuation Period. In this way, any underperformance over a given Valuation Period will have to be recovered before a performance fee becomes payable at the end of a subsequent Valuation Period. The performance reference period is therefore the entire life of the Sub-fund.

6. Investors' attention is drawn to the fact that the performance fee is subject to the crystallization principle. Where shares are redeemed on a date other than the date on which a Performance Fee is paid and a provision has been made for the Performance Fee, the amount of the provisioned Performance Fee attributable to the redeemed shares will be deemed to have vested in the Investment Manager and will be paid is paid within one month of the end of the relevant Valuation Period.In the event of subscription, the calculation of the performance fee is adjusted in order to avoid the subscription having an impact on the amount of provisions for performance fees. For the purposes of this adjustment, the amount relating to the subscription is removed from the calculation of the outperformance for the day in question. The provision for the performance fee will be reduced by 15% of the outperformance determined on the Valuation Day on which the subscriptions were deducted, multiplied by the number of shares subscribed.

At the date of the financial statements, no Outperformance fee was recorded in the Sub-Fund FFG - European Equities Sustainable Moderate.

The fees presented below include the Management and Distribution fees of the Master Sub-Fund.

Shares of class R Dis and R Acc:

Max. 1.5% p.a. calculated quarterly and based on the average net assets of the share class concerned + outperformance fee.

Shares of class I Acc:

Max. 0.95% p.a. calculated quarterly and based on the average net assets of the share class concerned + outperformance fees.

For the Sub-Fund FFG - Global Flexible Sustainable:

The SICAV has appointed WAYSTONE MANAGEMENT COMPANY (LUX) S.A. (formerly MDO Management Company S.A.) as Management Company to provide management, administration and marketing services. The Management Company is authorized as a Management Company pursuant to the provisions of chapter 15 of the Law of 2010.

The Management Company receives a management company fee of maximum 0.05% p.a. based on the average net assets of the Sub-Fund with a minimum of EUR 10,000.

The Management Company has appointed BLI - BANQUE DE LUXEMBOURG INVESTMENTS S.A. as Investment Manager to provide portfolio management services.

The Management Company has appointed FUNDS FOR GOOD S.A. as distribution coordinator. In this capacity, the distribution coordinator will be responsible to appoint one or more distributors to place the shares of the SICAV's Sub-Funds.

The Management and Distribution Fee is paid respectively to the Investment Manager and the Distribution Coordinator by the SICAV. The Management and Distribution Fee is different according to the class of shares to which it applies.

The Management and Distribution Fee is paid respectively to the Investment Manager and the Distribution Coordinator by the SICAV. The Management and Distribution Fee is different according to the class of shares to which it applies.

Max 1.60% p.a. calculated quarterly and based on the average net assets of the share class concerned.

Shares of class I Acc:

Max 0.85% p.a. calculated quarterly and based on the average net assets of the share class concerned.

Shares of class C Acc:

Max 1.05% p.a. calculated quarterly and based on the average net assets of the share class concerned.

Note 4 - Subscription duty ("taxe d'abonnement")

The SICAV is governed by the Luxembourg Law.

Pursuant to the legislation and regulations currently in force, the SICAV is subject to a subscription duty ("taxe d'abonnement") at an annual rate of 0.05% of the net assets, calculated and payable quarterly on the basis of the net assets at the end of each quarter.

In accordance with Article 175 a) of the amended law of 17th December 2010, the portion of net assets invested in UCIs already subject to the subscription duty (*"taxe d'abonnement"*) is exempt from this tax.

A reduced rate of 0.01% is applicable to the shares of class I Acc which are reserved to institutional investors.

Note 5 - Belgian subscription duty ("taxe d'abonnement belge")

Belgian legislation (the *«Code des droits et taxes divers»*, Art. 201.20-201.28) imposes the payment of an annual fee on Undertakings for Collective Investment authorised for marketing to the public in Belgium. This tax amounts to 0.0925% of the total, as at 31st December of the previous year, of the net amounts invested in Belgium, from their registration with the Financial Services and Markets Authority ("FSMA").

The SICAV pays the tax no later than 31st March of each year.

This tax is recorded in the caption "Other taxes" of the statement of operations and other changes in net assets.

Note 6 - Changes in the composition of the securities portfolio

The list of changes in the composition of the securities portfolio for the reference period of the financial statements may be obtained free of charge at the registered office of the SICAV.

Note 7 - Structure of the Feeder Fund - Master Fund

The Sub-Fund FFG - European Equities Sustainable Moderate is a feeder Sub-Fund that invests at least 85% of its net assets in the Sub-Fund FFG - European Equities Sustainable (the "Master Fund"), and more precisely in class I Acc. The performance of the Sub-Fund may differ from that of the Master Fund due to (i) the expenses borne by the sub-fund, (ii) the liquid assets held and (iii) the hedging techniques implemented by the Sub-Fund.

At the date of the financial statements, the percentage of holding of the Feeder Fund in the class I Acc of the Master Fund FFG - European Equities Sustainable was 59.88%.

In addition to its financial objective, the Sub-Fund generates a concrete social impact, through the SICAV's Distribution Coordinator, whose approach is certified by Forum Ethibel. After deducting its operating expenses, the Distribution Coordinator donates the largest amount between 50% of its net profits and 10% of its net turnover to the social project it has set up and runs, "Funds For Good Impact".

"Funds For Good Impact" devotes all of its financial resources to the fight against poverty and job creation, granting honorary loans and support to disadvantaged people with a business project, enabling them to start their own business. More information is available on <u>www.fundsforgood.eu</u>

The Sub-Fund invests at least 85% of its net assets in the Master Fund. On an ancillary basis and in order to limit the Sub-Fund's exposure to equity market risks, a systematic hedging of the equity exposure will be implemented. Hedging will limit the Fund's exposure to the equity market to a maximum of 50%. Portfolio assets not invested in the Master Fund or in hedging instruments will be kept as cash in the Sub-Fund.

Information on the Master Fund

The Master Fund is a Sub-Fund of the SICAV and is managed by the Management Company, which has appointed ACADIAN ASSET MANAGEMENT LLC as Investment Manager. The Management Company has put in place internal rules of conduct (the "Rules of Conduct") describing, inter alia, the coordination of the frequency and timing of NAV calculation and publication of the share price, the coordination of the transmission of subscription, redemption and conversion orders of the Sub-Fund and of events having an impact on subscription, redemption or conversion operations. Information on the Rules of Conduct is available on request from the Management Company.

The Prospectus (including the Master Fund fact sheet), the KIID and the most recent annual and semiannual reports of the Master Fund are available upon request at the registered office of the Management Company and on the following website: <u>https://www.waystone.com</u>. The investment objective and principal features of the Master Fund are described in more detail below.

In accordance with the EMIR provisions bound to mitigate the counterparty risk for financial counterparties executing over-the-counter financial derivative instruments (e.g. foreign exchange forward and foreign exchange swap transactions), the over-the-counter financial derivative instruments executed by the SICAV with BANQUE DE LUXEMBOURG (e.g. foreign exchange forward and foreign exchange swap transactions) are subject to daily variation margining. The Sub-Funds FFG - European Equities Sustainable Moderate, FFG - European Equities Sustainable and FFG - Global Flexible Sustainable have been reclassified from article 9 to article 8 of the SFDR disclosures. The shareholders of these 3 Sub-Funds were notified of this change on 2nd January 2023.

1 - Risk management

As required by Circular CSSF 11/512 as amended, the Board of Directors of the SICAV needs to determine the global risk exposure of the SICAV by applying either the commitment approach or the VaR ("Value at Risk") approach.

In terms of risk management, the Board of Directors of the SICAV decided to adopt the commitment approach as a method of determining the global exposure.

2 - Remuneration

Waystone Management Company (Lux) S.A. has adopted a remuneration policy pursuant to applicable laws and regulations with the objective to ensure that its remuneration structure is in line with its interests and those of the collective investment schemes it manages and to prevent risk- taking which is inconsistent with the risk profiles, rules or articles of incorporation or management regulations of the collective investment schemes.

Details of the remuneration policy of the management company, including the persons in charge of determining the fixed and variable remunerations of staff, a description of the key remuneration elements and an overview of how remuneration is determined, is available at https://www.waystone.com/waystone-policies.

With respect to the financial year ended 31 December 2022 (as of that date, the management company had a headcount of 92 employees), the total fixed and variable remuneration paid by the management company to its employees amounted to EUR 6,680,489.44 and to EUR 865,637.79 respectively. The total remuneration paid by the management company to senior management and members of its staff whose actions have a material impact on the risk profile of the collective investment schemes managed amounted to EUR 3,736,654.76. The remuneration committee of the management company has reviewed the implementation of the remuneration policy and has not identified any deficiency in that respect. Moreover, the current version of the remuneration policy was updated and approved by the board of directors in the course of the financial year ended 31 December 2022, the current version being dated February 2021. The compensation policy will be reviewed and approved by the Board of Directors during the second quarter of 2023.

Issuing companies had to have a minimum ESG score as calculated by MSCI. This score covers all three dimensions of ESG and gives an indication of how a given issuer compares to other issuers in terms of ESG risk. The imposition of a minimum ESG score makes it possible to avoid investing in companies that could pose significant ESG risk for the Sub-fund. In addition, companies with the worst labour management records have been excluded from this Sub-fund.

Promoting job creation to fight poverty

In addition to the environmental and social characteristics promoted by the Sub-fund through its investments, investing in this Sub-fund has indirectly generated a concrete social impact through Funds For Good, the distribution coordinator of the SICAV. After deducting its operating costs, Funds For Good donates 50% of its net profits or 10% of its revenues – whichever is larger – to the social project "Funds For Good Impact", which it created and manages. "Funds for Good Impact" dedicates all of its financial resources to fighting poverty by promoting job creation. "Funds For Good Impact" provides interest-free, unsecured loans to people in precarious employment situations with a business project. This financial support (coupled with human support in the form of coaching) enables these entrepreneurs to start their own business. More information is also available at www.fundsforgood.eu.

How did the sustainability indicators perform?

The following sustainability indicators have been used to assess the achievement of each of the environmental or social characteristics promoted by the Sub-fund:

Carbon emissions

The weighted average carbon emissions (scope 1 and scope 2) of the portfolio must be at least 50% lower than the weighted average carbon emissions of its benchmark, the MSCI Europe. **Compliance with international human and labour rights standards**:

Issuing companies were required to comply with at least the UN Global Compact, the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights, the International Labour Organisation standards and the OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises. Any company that violates these principles or has been proven, through controversy screening, to have been responsible for undesirable human rights, labour, environmental and anti-corruption behaviour was excluded from our investment universe.

The exclusion of socially controversial activities

Involvement was measured on the basis of the share of the company's turnover that comes from the harmful activity. Involvement beyond a certain materiality threshold results in the company being excluded from the investment universe.

- There is zero tolerance for any involvement in controversial weapons or speculation in agricultural commodities.
- There is a 5% threshold for any economic activity related to tobacco, coal and unconventional oil and gas.
- For conventional oil and gas activities, a threshold of 5% has been set at portfolio level.

- For electricity generation, power companies are permitted in the portfolio provided that they derive more than 50% of their revenues from renewables and that they do not derive more than 5% of their revenues from coal-fired power generation.
- The fund will not hold financial instruments issued by governments or state-owned enterprises in countries that violate the UN Global Compact, or are subject to international sanctions, or in countries under EU embargo.
- If the issuing company is listed on the FFG Exclusion List, all securities issued by that company are excluded from the Sub-fund's investment universe.

Issuer companies had to have a minimum ESG score of BBB for developed markets and a minimum ESG score of BB for emerging markets. Any issuer that is in the bottom 5% of the investment universe in terms of Labor Management Score is excluded from the Sub-fund's investment universe.









The environmental and social characteristics promoted by the fund were measured using financial and extra-financial data published by the companies or external data providers. Internal estimates were used where some data were not available.

Environmental and social characteristics were monitored before each investment and on a regular basis after the investment, at least monthly.

In addition, the investment manager, Acadian, in accordance with its engagement policy, has taken into account certain sustainability themes within the companies in which Acadian has invested (on its own behalf or on behalf of its clients). This has resulted in direct engagement with the companies concerned, collaborative engagement or participation in third-party initiatives. These efforts focused on the three main ESG themes of Acadian's investment process: climate action, corporate culture and corporate behaviour. Acadian conducts both direct engagements and participates in collaborative engagements through Climate Action 100+ to discuss the steps companies are taking in the transition to a low-carbon economy and the robustness of their net zero strategies.

As an example, it is in this context that Acadia, through the Climate Action 100+ initiative, approached AGL Energy, an Australian company producing electricity for Australian households and businesses. More than 70% of AGL Energy's electricity production comes from thermal coal. Following a number of meetings with members of AGL Energy's executive board to discuss the company's climate strategy, the company decided to publish carbon reduction targets and to factor emissions reductions into the calculation of executive remuneration. More recently, the company has endorsed the goal of becoming net zero by 2050.







Engagement took place either individually (direct contact with the company concerned and voting/resolutions at general meetings) or collaboratively (via engagement platforms).







The environmental and social characteristics promoted by the fund were measured using financial and extra-financial data published by the companies or external data providers. Internal estimates were used where some data were not available.

Environmental and social characteristics were monitored before each investment and on a regular basis after the investment, at least monthly.

In addition, the investment manager, Acadian, in accordance with its engagement policy, has taken into account certain sustainability themes within the companies in which Acadian has invested (on its own behalf or on behalf of its clients). This has resulted in direct engagement with the companies concerned, collaborative engagement or participation in third-party initiatives. These efforts focused on the three main ESG themes of Acadian's investment process: climate action, corporate culture and corporate behaviour. Acadian conducts both direct engagements and participates in collaborative engagements through Climate Action 100+ to discuss the steps companies are taking in the transition to a low-carbon economy and the robustness of their net zero strategies.

As an example, it is in this context that Acadia, through the Climate Action 100+ initiative, approached AGL Energy, an Australian company producing electricity for Australian households and businesses. More than 70% of AGL Energy's electricity production comes from thermal coal. Following a number of meetings with members of AGL Energy's executive board to discuss the company's climate strategy, the company decided to publish carbon reduction targets and to factor emissions reductions into the calculation of executive remuneration. More recently, the company has endorsed the goal of becoming net zero by 2050.

All investments made in equities by the Sub-fund were aligned with the environmental and social characteristics promoted by the Sub-fund. 
To what extent were the sustainable investments with an environmental objective aligned with the EU Taxonomy?

This Sub-fund has not targeted sustainable investments within the meaning of Article 17(2) of Regulation 2019/2088 and therefore has not committed to a minimum alignment with the EU Taxonomy Regulation, as the Investment Manager is unable to determine the precise extent to which the Sub-fund's investments are environmentally friendly activities aligned with the EU Taxonomy or investments in enabling and transitional activities. Therefore, the minimum measurement was 0%.

The investments included under "#2 Other" were investments in cash, bank deposits, money market instruments, money market funds or other eligible liquid assets or investments for hedging purposes.



What actions have been taken to meet the environmental and/or social characteristics during the reference period?

On at least an annual basis, the investment manager has monitored the suitability of the securities in the portfolio for the environmental and/or social characteristics promoted. The exclusion factors were checked before each investment and on a regular basis after the investment.

The investment manager has also undertaken shareholder engagement with certain portfolio companies. Indeed, Capricorn Partners is an active shareholder, investing a significant portion of its assets under management in small and medium-sized growth companies listed in Europe. To this end, Capricorn Partners engages with portfolio companies in personal contact with management to discuss and promote ESG issues. In addition, Capricorn Partners exercises its voting rights in accordance with its code of conduct.

A notable example is the engagement with the Accell Group, in the context of the takeover bid by a consortium led by the US investment firm KKR. On 24 January 2022, Accell Group and a consortium led by the US investment firm KKR agreed on a takeover bid. On 4 April 2022, the fund contacted the CEO on this issue. On 20 May 2022, Accell held an extraordinary general meeting to vote on the terms of the takeover bid. The fund voted against resolution 2B to implement a "triangular" merger at this meeting. We were of the opinion that this triangular merger was a legal construct to increase the pressure to accept the Accell takeover bid. Despite open opposition from some major minority shareholders and our dissenting vote, the resolution was accepted.

As of the date of this report, Capricorn's full 2022 engagement report has not yet been released, but will be available later on Capricorn's website.
